JOB'S INTEGRITY

"I will never admit you are in the right; till I die, I will not deny my integrity (Job 27:5, NIV)."

We're all familiar with that compelling and powerful book of Job. Such longsuffering and perseverance is found in his story! How he manages to retain his trust and faith in God through it all is, obviously, inspiring! And then there's this one word, "integrity," that is found in the aforementioned passage. I was captured by this word, convicted, in fact. So much so, that I researched it a bit and felt inspired to share some reflections herein.

This is what Wikipedia says about integrity: "Integrity is a concept of consistency of actions, values, methods, measures, principles, expectations, and outcomes. In ethics, integrity is regarded as the honesty and truthfulness or accuracy of one's actions. Integrity can be regarded as the opposite of hypocrisy, in that it regards internal consistency as a virtue. . . The word "integrity" stems from the Latin adjective integer (whole, complete). In this context, integrity is the inner sense of "wholeness" deriving from qualities such as honesty and consistency of character. As such, one may judge that others "have integrity" to the extent that they act according to the values, beliefs and principles they claim to hold (http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Integrity)."

So it seems that to be a person of integrity, one must both think and act consistently and rightly. Easier said than done! Oh, this is hard to be and do, for all of us! We are so often tormented by corrupting thoughts and actions, resulting in personal struggles, the inevitable effects of the Fall of Humankind. Most all that come to Marble Retreat seeking hope, healing and restoration, do so in various states of "disintegration," a disruption to their sense of integrity. They arrive suffering from significant inconsistencies within themselves, their thoughts, feelings and their behaviors, resulting in brokenness, hopelessness, anxiety and depression. When we find ourselves "disintegrated," either by our own actions or the actions of others, we enter into a season of painful confusion. We've "lost our compass," so to speak. This is particularly painful for clergy, since one of their main roles as earthly shepherds is to provide a "moral compass" to people. But disintegration, the loss of our integrity, is painful for all of us!

Job knew the trials and pain that can cause disintegration, but, somehow, he did not compromise his integrity. He remained steadfast in his faith and trust in God and proclaimed this to his friends-turned-detractors, Eliphaz, Bildad and Zophar. How did he do this? It might be argued that his capacity to lament, voice his pain, helped him maintain his integrity. This seems to occur in the gatherings here at Marble Retreat, too! In fact, we seem to observe, time and again, people re-integrating, capturing anew their integrity, through their honest, authentic and heartfelt lament.

So, what are we to make of all this? First off, one's outside actions must follow one's inside thoughts. As Christians, the standard for integrity, for rightness or righteousness, is exemplified in the person and character of Jesus. We follow Him! Let's do our best to have faith and to follow Him! Then, when the inevitable trials of this world come and we find ourselves disintegrated, it is both right and good to lament one's plight. It helps considerably to be able to do so in the midst of a few close friends and/or family. There's healing and strength in confession. Take hope in the life of Job. If he can do it, if he can maintain his integrity in the midst of such trials, we can, too!
